
Meet A CRC Animal Researcher – "The Mice Whisperer"

Cartoons and psychology of animated characters are the two first things I learned during my childhood and became my favorite. Being a cartoonist is one of my fantasies, but I ended up studying clinical biochemistry in my undergraduate and became a young researcher. I first became interested in biochemical pathways in bone and dental diseases since I started my M.Sc. IBS at Dr. Ryan Ross lab, at Rush University. I continued to pursue this interest as an IBS PhD student where I conducted research with Dr. Ryan Ross on the ways of improvement of bone and dental mineralization at XLH mice and the mechanism of action for canonical Wnt signaling in XLH hyp mice model. This resulted in a co-authorship publication, as well as presenting a poster at the ASBMR about dental and alveolar bone mineralization in Hyp mice. My study mice have been an inspiration to me since day one in Dr. Ross's lab. It is always interesting to observe their behavior and to understand their body language. I always believe that each creature has their own way of


communication, and to have a better connection, you need to understand that type of communication. In my study mice case, I learned a lot about mice body language and that helped me in managing my mice colony for my studies. Since my first day in the lab, I noticed there is lack of data about mice colony history, and that inspired me to create a database about my mice colony history that incudes their date of birth, genotype, sex, parent information, health records, mating records, psychological records, etc. I also designed a birth certificate for each mouse in my colony and I gave them names that match their behavior. For instance, Muffin is one of the favorite mice I had during my 3 years I spent at Dr. Ross's lab, she had XLH mutation and she was so friendly and fluffy. She learned fast how to be petted and to enjoy her treat in my hand pale! During breeding season, I run them a matching poll and make sure I put the right couples together. I also keep that in my records for next breeding. For the pregnant mice, I track their pregnancy and I keep on the cage a sign "Mouse pup shower". Surly, we don't actually run them a pup shower, but I make sure to give them a firstclass dental checkups every month.



During "Christmouse" holidays, I decorate their cages with a "mouse-santa" hats so they can leave their wishes and write whether they were good mice or naughty ones. I believe this spreads cheerfulness and spirit of holidays around the colony.



My mice inspiration was not one presented in how I managed my colony, mice birth certificates and colony map and database, but also, I sketched my own comics based on my colony mice and named it "The Family Mouse".



Currently, I'm willing to continue sketching my comics and to keep using my cartoon sketches in writing lab protocols and colony management protocols so that would benefit all the upcoming students who are willing to be young researchers! At the end, success starts with three things: the will, creativity, and communication, even communication with your study mice is counted!
