This report is limited to the final six months of my appointment, January through June 2024. After completing our National



Institute on Aging-funded clinical trial "Dementia Caregiver Chronic Grief Management: A Live Online Video Intervention," we are reanalyzing data for manuscript submission. Preliminary analyses indicate that our grief management intervention, which is designed to address family caregivers' grief and other mental health symptoms in the context of placement of a family member in long-term care, had a significant effect on participants' anxiety and grief levels.
